LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY

Jan. 9, 2024:

SEPECC leaders met virtually with **Senator Bob** Casey's **legislative** aide on education: **Sydney Brooks**































Sydney Brooks, thank your boss, Senator Casey, for his continuous championing of quality childcare, and for cosponsoring SB 1354, the Childcare for Working Families
Act.

Here is our collected testimony to help him get this bill passed!

Jackie Groetsch of First Up: First Up and SEPECC both empower early childhood educators with resources and support, making sure they are fully deserving of a living wage and growth.

Mary Graham of Children's Village: ECE funding is based on a flawed system of subsidy payments based on market rate survey, not on the true cost of care model.

Laverne Cheesboro of Heavenly Made Creations: As one of approximately 400 Family Childcare programs in PA, she is committed to her families who cannot pay more, but the inability to pay staff prevents her from expanding and flourishing.

Shineal Hunter of Family Circle Academy: As a 4th generation child care provider, I am heartbroken that I recently had to close my center, return to being a family program and thus turn many children away. My daughters won't want to make childcare a 5th generation business...it's just not sustainable.

Damaris Alvarado-Rodriguez of Children's Playhouse Early Learning Centers: Many of my kids who have faced trauma in their lives are further traumatized by the constant turnover of my teachers. Like so many, these teachers are often forced to leave jobs they love to get higher paying jobs elsewhere.

Shawn Towey of PACCA: 90% of childcare programs in Pennsylvania report staffing crises, an inability to operate at capacity or to accept more kids. The impact of inadequate childcare which forces parents to stay home is estimated at \$6.65 billion.

Eleanor Levie, a volunteer advocate with SEPECC from the National Council of Jewish Women NCJW). Inspired by my Jewish values, I know that quality childcare should be a right for all kids. It's a moral imperative that we lift up children and their families: quality childcare and parent engagement = a path out of poverty.

SYDNEY BROOKS' RESPONSE

- Thank you for your stories. We may ask you to present testimony in a committee hearing.
- 2024 is still in a state of play.
- In the Democratic Caucus, the Childcare for Working Families Act is a pillar (i.e., essential).
- Yes, there will be budget concessions made to the minority party.
- Help us move the needle with Republican legislators.
- Advocate for a House bill companion to SB 1534 Brian Fitzpatrick (R, Bucks County) could be a key player!



ECE WINS AROUND THE STATES

- New Mexico and the District of Columbia use cost estimation models to set child care subsidy rates for providers based on the cost of highquality care.
- New Mexico also <u>raised eligibility for</u> <u>child care subsidies</u> for families earning up to 400 percent of federal poverty guidelines while waiving copays, effectively making child care free for these families.
- Vermont is investing \$125 million annually to expand subsidies for families earning up to 575 percent of the FPL.
- The governor of North
 Dakota signed a bill in April
 2023 that <u>eliminates copayments</u> for families with incomes under
 100 percent of the FPL.

ECE WINS AROUND THE STATES

Eight states have <u>set income eligibility</u> <u>at the federal limit</u> of no more than 85 percent of state median income (SMI), and 21 states have set the second tier graduated phase-out level at 85 percent of SMI.



Minnesota invested \$750 million in new funding for child care and early learning programs, expanding eligibility for child care assistance and establishing the Great Start Compensation Support Payment Program for child care providers. New York invested in its child care sector by expanding eligibility for subsidies to families earning up to 300 percent of the FPL, waiving copays for families under 100 percent of the FPL, and capping copays for all other families at 10 percent of their income.

LOCAL ADVOCACY WORKS!

- Washington state's Fair Start for Kids initiative raises family income limits for child care subsidies to 60 percent of the SMI and caps family copays at 7 percent of income. It also raises provider reimbursement rates to the 85th percentile of market rates and funds health insurance for providers.
- Louisiana, Wisconsin, West Virginia, and Utah have also set their reimbursement rates above the 75th percentile of the market rate.


We used the Snowflake Activity as an inspiration.

Montgomery County: Childcare Operation Recovery Grant Program

- Approximately \$4,000,000 has been allocated out of the Montgomery County Recovery Plan for the Childcare Operation Recovery Grant Program. This funding provides operational grants to licensed Childcare Providers and School-aged Before and After School programs in Montgomery County to help them recover from the financial impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic caused by decreased enrollments, reduced staffing, and/or closures due to COVID-19 outbreaks.
- In order to be eligible for this program, providers must be licensed by Pennsylvania DHS/OCDEL Bureau of Certification and must have a physical address within Montgomery County. The amount of each grant will be determined by the number of children for which the facility is licensed.
- The Montgomery County Recovery Office is currently accepting applications for the Childcare Operation Recovery Grant Program from eligible providers in Montgomery County.

I. At-Home Activities to Boost Student Outcomes:

Literacy:

- Read together daily: Choose engaging books from the suggested list below (English and Spanish!).
- Play rhyming games: Sing rhyming songs, clap syllables, create silly rhymes together.

- Sing songs and dance: Engage in playful activities that build confidence and express emotions.



- Tell your child what you notice they are good at; offer challenges based on their strengths.
